Online premiere of a new film by Alex Schady - co-commissioned by Animate Projects and Camden Arts Centre - at animateprojects.org

Animate Projects is pleased to announce the online premiere of Everything Must Go, a film by Alex Schady, co-commissioned with Camden Arts Centre. The film was made in collaboration with a group of young people from the Lithos Road Housing Estate, north west London. It combines animation with live action to create a bizarre sci-fi universe of ritual.

Alex says: "I wanted to invite the participating families to consider the possibility of supernatural happenings or unexplained events within the housing estate. Science fiction has always interested me as it seems to offer a way of discussing fears or anxieties that exist in the real world and I thought this could be an interesting way of approaching the project."

Everything Must Go, was first shown at Camden Arts Centre in March 2009 and will be viewable online at animateprojects.org from 18 May 2009.

Alongside the off-site workshops with the Lithos Road Estate, the residency included two film screenings that took place in late 2008 at Camden Arts Centre, curated by residency artist, Alex Schady. And included a selection of films from the Animate archive. At the In With the New workshops in December 2008, the audience was invited to make sculptural apparitions, that using green screen technologies were inserted into the fabric of the film. Alex Schady is an artist and filmmaker with a broad interdisciplinary practice. His work uses materials immediately to hand, incorporating modern-life ephemera that is manipulated and re-interpreted across a variety of media. Combining craft techniques and digital processes his most recent work uses the language of science fiction to explore the psyche of contemporary culture.
