Pick of the day



Animate TV 12.00am-12.50 C4

Ever the home of the brilliant, the infuriating and the startling, Animate Projects brings its latest commissions (also available to view on www.animateprojects.org) to the C4 graveyard slot for another year. 'Tad's Nest' (pictured) is the standout of the four short films, a combination of painted glass and digital layering, distinguished by wonderful sound design. The stuff of Hans Christian Andersen's nightmares, it begins in fairytale idyll before heading somewhere much darker. Cordelia Swann's 'Amnesia' follows, a visually unnerving collage of moving images shot on a mobile phone and narrated by Jo Brand. As an exploration of the condition, it's a mixed success, Brand's down-to-earth tones and not hugely compelling voiceover actually detracting from the film's undoubted technical achievement.

'Unicycle Film' is third, a monochrome peek at the animation process which uses actors, stop-frame and flipbooks to create the sort of witty but slightly unengaging take on motion and technique. Closing the show is 'For Cultural Purposes Only', a recreation of Palestinian films lost in the 1982 siege of Beirut. It's a powerful observation on how emotion can colour memory, only tangentially political but quietly angry nonetheless. Moving images, indeed. Gabriel Tate
