Ben Rivers: Slow Action



Ben Rivers, Slow Action

Animate Projects is delighted to present Slow Action by Ben Rivers, a new fourpart film about future island utopias. The work will be online on animateprojects.org from 21 January to coincide with the film's exhibition at Matt's Gallery, London.

Slow Action is a post-apocalyptic science fiction film that continues Rivers' exploration of curious and extraordinary environments. The film, shot in Lanzarote, Gunkanjima, Tuvalu and Somerset, applies the idea of island biogeography - the study of how species and eco-systems evolve differently when isolated and surrounded by unsuitable habitat - to a conception of the Earth in a few hundred years; the sea level rising to absurd heights, creating hyperbolic utopias that appear as possible future mini-societies.

The work includes animated scenes, which carry on Rivers' interest in the 'movie magic' of early cinema. The soundtrack - narratives by writer Mark von Schlegell - details each of the four islands' evolutions according to their geographical, geological, climatic and botanical conditions.

Ben Rivers studied Fine Art at Falmouth School of Art, 1990-93. He has exhibited widely at international film festivals and galleries, and won various awards. He received the Paul Hamlyn Foundation Award for Artists 2010, and was shortlisted for the Film London/Channel 4 Jarman Award 2010.

He has been the recipient of a number of commissions, including LAFVA 2007, for which he made two films – Origin of the Species and Ah, Liberty! and Vauxhall Collective commission 2008, making I Know Where I'm Going. He was included in ICA's Nought To Sixty programme, and has had solo shows at A Foundation, Liverpool in 2009 and Kate MacGarry, London in 2010. Visit <u>benrivers.com</u>.
